- Subject close to my heart, and that of the FST.
- ▶ Some interesting comparisons with the 'journey' of other industry sectors.
- Driving systemic change vs. quick fix.
- Learning lessons for the broader benefit.

Review Timeline

- ▶ Review announced on 28 July 2017.
 - Reporting jointly to Housing Secretary and Home Secretary.
 - End-to-end review looking at fire safety system as a whole and the people working within it.
 - Assess effectiveness of building and fire safety regulations,
 with a focus on multi-occupancy high-rise residential buildings.
 - Make recommendations that will ensure we have a sufficiently robust regulatory system for the future.
- ▶ Terms of Reference 30 August 2017
- Mapping, Call for Evidence, stakeholder bilaterals & roundtables
- ▶ Interim Report 18 December 2017
- Summit meeting 22 January 2018
- Final Report Spring 2018

Review Methodology

- Systems based approach.
- ▶ Clear to see why the current system does not work.
- Radical overhaul required at systems level.

Interim Report - Overall Findings

- There needs to be a significant culture change to increase ownership and responsibility.
- Current regulatory system for ensuring fire safety in high rise and complex buildings is not fit for purpose.
- Problem connected to the culture of the construction industry, building management, and the effectiveness of the regulator that oversees it.
- ▶ This applies throughout the building life cycle, both during construction and occupation.
- Industry needs to own and take responsibility for managing and maintaining integrity of buildings once they are in use.

Interim Report – Emerging Themes

- ▶ Regulations & guidance complex and unclear.
- ▶ Clarity of roles and responsibilities is poor.
- ▶ Means of assessing and ensuring **competency** is weak.
- ▶ Compliance, enforcement and sanctions processes are too weak.
- ▶ **Route for residents** to escalate concerns is unclear and inadequate.
- ▶ The **system of product testing** is not clear.

Interim Report – Direction of Travel (1)

- ▶ **Regulation & guidance** more risk-based approach. Less Government, more sector-based risk ownership.
- Roles and responsibilities clearer senior accountability across life-cycle.
- ▶ **Competence** raising standards, greater accreditation across design, construction, inspection and occupation.

Interim Report – Direction of Travel (2)


- ▶ Compliance and enforcement 'golden thread' design intent (or proper change control) sustained with regular reviews & gaming more clearly penalised.
- ▶ **Residents' voice** clearer, quicker route for residents' concerns to be addressed.
- Product testing more effective testing/certifying process.
 Marketing easier to interpret.

Interim Report – Recommendations

- Report includes short-term recommendations, which fit with direction of travel. For example:
 - Work on restructuring Approved Documents
 - Use of desktop studies should be restricted
 - Professional bodies to propose how to improve standards.
- ➤ The second phase of work will drive all these forward including work with industry, other external stakeholders and across Whitehall.

The Next Phase

- > January 22 Summit launch-pad for next phase.
- > Explicit 'call to action' to industry to recognise magnitude of change required.
- > Joint industry and Review Team policy work, under the systemic umbrella of the review.
- Work streams answering key outstanding questions, and how to implement change.
- > Role for Civil Servants and for external industry experts.
- > Final report Spring 2018 continued systemic approach.
